Inaugural Address 2005

Mayor Derek Corrigan delivered the Inaugural Address at the Council meeting of December 5, 2005.

The text that follows is abridged. The full text is available on-line.



AS MAYOR, IT IS MY PRIVILEGE TO DELIVER THE INAUGURAL ADDRESS. This is the opportunity to report how things have gone this year, and what the priorities are for the future. But before I get started, it is important to note that behind these programs, policies and statistics, there are literally thousands of people working to make Burnaby a better place. I don't just mean the excellent staff and management team that work here. I mean all the community groups, business associations, non profit agencies, Block Watch groups, parent advisory committees, Streamkeepers and other community stewards that work to make Burnaby the best place it can be. This Address is, in many ways, a reflection of all that work and effort, as well as an expression of the priorities of this community.

On behalf of Council, I think it is also appropriate to reflect upon what it is that we do, and who we do it for. Every child, youth, senior, immigrant, business owner, refugee, person with a disability or financial hardship, is the focus of our work as Mayor and Council. We represent their interests and our job is to make this city work for them. That is no small task. We have a very diverse population. The 2001 Census indicated that 47% of Burnaby residents are immigrants. Burnaby Family Life reports that there are over 100 different languages spoken in Burnaby, representing people from Afghanistan to Zanzibar. There is an incredible richness here that our citizens bring with them. It is precisely this diversity and uniqueness that make this city so special, and that we want to work to support and preserve.

Building activity has continued at unprecedented rates. We surpassed last year's record building permit level in the first ten months of this year, which topped \$574 million. 48% of all new construction has been multiple family residential development. I am very pleased to say that this growth has been directed according to our Official Community Plan, which accommodates new multi family development in town centres and urban villages, thereby protecting our established single and two family areas.

This has been a period of tremendous change for the Edmonds area, with the new HighGate development - which has been very well received - the opening of the Taylor Park Elementary School and Byrne Creek Secondary School, significant redevelopment of older residential properties and new sidewalks and streetlights throughout the area. Many other significant projects are underway which will support this growing population, including a new library and major mixed use development at the corner of Kingsway and Edmonds, a new pool, expanded Eastburn Recreation Centre and a new Community Policing Office. There are other issues in the Edmonds Town Centre that we have been grappling with over the last three years – issues of property crime, drugs and prostitution. We have chosen to take the hard line, forming the Task Force on Problem Properties to target and remove this criminal element.

The City has also consulted with community groups, agencies and the public in the Edmonds area about health care,

homelessness and food security, among other issues. While there is much we can do at the municipal level, and have done, the federal and provincial governments have a responsibility to address issues such as housing and health care. We have been pursuing discussions with both governments regarding partnerships to work collaboratively on a range of urban development issues, to bring all resources to bear on these issues.

Growth places additional demands on our services, from parks and recreation opportunities to fire and police services to the infrastructure below our streets. Safety is always our first and number one priority. 2005 was a year of growth for the Burnaby RCMP Detachment. The detachment received twelve new officers this year, increasing the force to 253 positions. This increase allowed for the establishment of a Problem Oriented Policing Unit, which focuses on dealing with problem or repeat situations. An additional 12 officers had been requested and will be received in 2006.

Our four Community Policing Offices allow direct contact with the needs of their respective neighbourhoods, ensuring that policing priorities identified in the community are understood, identified and addressed. And, indeed, we have seen an overall drop in the crime rate in this city over the last year. Obviously, bringing it down further is a high priority for us. In addition to the increased Burnaby force, we also participate in regional RCMP services with the Integrated Homicide Team and the Emergency Response Team. We cost share these services with participating communities, as well as the provincial and federal governments.

The Fire Department has had another excellent year. We have retained an architect for the new No. 7 Fire Hall at Gilmore and Canada Way. A facilities review of the No. 1 Fire Hall is expected in the new year in order to assess needed administration and training space. Additional firefighting equipment was purchased this year, including an all terrain vehicle which has proven very beneficial by allowing our firefighters to access remote areas of the City. Maintaining excellent service and response times remains a top priority for the Department.

In addition to safety, providing resources for life long learning is also a priority. There were over two million user visits to our public libraries in the last year. Library staff have been focusing on enhancing the community's access to library services, bringing the library to even more people by promoting 24/7 access through Internet services. The use of library services over the Internet has increased nearly 30% from 2003. The library has also been piloting programs such as conversation circles to promote language skills for residents learning English, while enhancing their knowledge and use of the library's collection and services.

Nearly 25% of our city is in parks and open space, and Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services is one of the City's largest departments. We have seen a steady increase in our parkland, with the continued acquisition of key sites. We have also continued a steady investment in upgrading our recreational facilities. Providing public facilities is something I believe we do very well. We also need to do what we can to ensure that everyone has the opportunity to

use them. To that end, the Service Credit Program continues, offering access to program registrations or passes at nearly all of our parks, recreation or cultural services facilities. We also offer a number of low or no cost summer programs for youth at outdoor pools, parks and rec centres.

The Engineering Department has the responsibility of ensuring that our roads and sidewalks are maintained, that our water is delivered and removed, and that all our garbage and recycling is taken care of. With funding from the federal and provincial governments, the City has embarked on a comprehensive program of sewer separation in North Burnaby, thus eliminating overflows. Working with the Ministry of Transportation, we have also vastly improved the Sprott and Highway #1 interchange.

It is also necessary to provide alternative transportation for those that choose to walk, bike or use public transit, so it is not only safe, but welcoming and enjoyable to use. Alternative transportation is also critical in managing the region's traffic issues. In addition to the ongoing construction of the Sea-to-River Bikeway, two other bikeways are planned for the Cariboo and South Slope areas. The Central Valley Greenway is also under construction in Burnaby, and when completed in 2007 will provide a safe and scenic bicycle and pedestrian facility from False Creek in Vancouver to Coquitlam and the New Westminster Quay.

The City is committed to undertaking a comprehensive dredging program to provide long-term protection and enhancement of the Burnaby Lake ecosystem and to restoring rowing opportunities in the lake. In 2005, we initiated the Lake Rejuvenation Project with the intent to implement the project in the summer of 2006, subject to final funding commitment from the provincial and federal governments.

We are committed to enhancing our natural environment through habitat restoration projects, including the reclamation of asphalt for bioponds in one instance in the Brentwood Town Centre. Biodiversity and invasive species studies have been conducted for Still Creek. We continue to work with the community stewards and Streamkeepers to protect our riparian areas and returning salmon stocks. The City adopted a Total Stormwater Management Policy to guide development projects within the City to improve stormwater management through flow reduction, absorbent landscape design and impervious area reduction. A bylaw restricting the amount of pervious surfaces permitted has also been developed.

We have made a significant investment in energy retrofits for City buildings and facilities. We expect this to result in a 15% reduction in energy use, a reduction of nearly 1,700 tonnes of greenhouse gases, and a savings of \$500,000 per year. This means that our initial investment of \$6.3 million will be repaid within 11 years.

We continue to work actively with the City's four business and merchant groups: the Burnaby Board of Trade, Heights Merchants Association, Edmonds Town Centre Business and Community Association and the North Road Business Improvement Association. Each of these groups not only supports but initiates steps to enhance their community and make them successful commercial centres. The uniqueness of each group reflects the diverse communities that exist here and the unique projects and programs that all of these organizations develop. There is strength and economic resiliency in this diversity, and we need to continue to foster and develop it. This has been one of the messages of the Economic Development Strategy currently underway with a broad based steering committee representing the many different sectors of our community.

- MasterFILE Premier (nearly 1,950 titles covering general reference, business, health, education and more)

What's on the horizon for us? Where do we go from here? Our Economic Development Strategy will certainly help shape that vision. We also know what significant projects we must start planning for: a renewed RCMP headquarters, a fire hall in the Big Bend area, a new Works Yard, a new CG Brown pool and a pool in Lougheed Town Centre.

But in preparing for the future, we must not neglect our past. We continue to make strides in preserving and enhancing our collective heritage through our heritage planning program, museum and archives, working in concert with our community partners. The Community Heritage Commission has accomplished a number of important projects, including the designation of several new privately held city heritage sites and the publication of the very popular "In the Shadow by the Sea", a history of Burnaby's Barnet village. The completion of Burnaby's World War II Honour Roll was a special project that honoured our hometown heroes during the Year of the Veteran.

The Clerk's Department successfully implemented a new on-line system to check voter registration for the 2005 municipal election. Going "high tech" seems to be the theme for the City Clerk, as live web streaming of Council meetings will be implemented in 2006. An on-line archive of Council meetings will also be generated, and linked to Council agendas such that a user can "jump" from the agenda to that specific part of the meeting, thereby enhancing our citizens' ability to get information about their City 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

With all of this, it's important not to forget that the City is also a business, and we are accountable to the bottom line. I'm very pleased to say that both our residential and business tax rates remain very competitive with our neighbouring municipalities. Our reserves are healthy and adequate for the parkland purchase, equipment replacement and infrastructure renewal that is planned over the next several years.

I also want to offer our thanks to Councillors Celest Redman and Doug Evans for their many years of dedicated service to our community. Both have served on Council for 15 years, and in that time have represented the interests of their constituents at an exemplary level. Councillor Redman has played a significant role in the revitalization of the Heights, and brought the needs of residents to the fore with her years of work on the Housing Committee, to name but two of her many accomplishments. Councillor Evans was instrumental in bringing Community Policing to Burnaby, something that has fundamentally changed the face of policing in our city. His role in the Traffic and Transportation Committees has also been extremely valuable. On behalf of Council, as well as the citizens of Burnaby, we thank you both.

As we embark on our next term, I want to recognize the tremendous efforts of our returning Councillors, Pietro Calendino, Sav Dhaliwal, Dan Johnston, Colleen Jordan, Lee Rankin and Nick Volkow. It has been my pleasure to serve with these dedicated individuals, each of whom serve on numerous committees, represent the City in liaison positions, and work to achieve the vision of this City held by our citizens. I also want to welcome Gary Begin and Garth Evans, who join us in the mission to make our city the best place it can be. We have an obligation to put the needs of our citizens at the forefront of every decision we make. I'm proud of our history together. We have accomplished a great deal, and I know the next three years will provide new challenges and new opportunities. Working together, we can continue to make Burnaby the most progressive and responsible city in the province. ❁

Responding to Hurricane Katrina

Stepping over dead fish in the parking lot even though we were miles away from the water, seeing almost a thousand cars lined up for miles on the side of the highway - families waiting patiently in the hot sun with children and elderly in the cars since 4:00 p.m. yesterday, at least 50 police and National Guard from all over the US, broken plate glass windows and store contents all over the place and a 7' high watermark on the walls of the factory outlet site we were working on - those were the sights I saw on my first day in Slidell. The sights and stories I would see and hear throughout my time there would hold me spellbound. I was honoured to be chosen to serve the American Red Cross again. ❁

2006 Home Owner Grant

On 2006 January 10, the Province of B.C. announced that it is introducing amendments to raise the full Home Owner Grant threshold in 2006 to \$780,000 in assessed property value. For 2005, the threshold was \$685,000. Home owners who own and occupy eligible residences are eligible to apply for the Home Owner Grant. The application must be completed each year.

The Basic Home Owner Grant (under 65 years of age) is \$470, and is eliminated at \$874,000 of assessed value. The Basic and Added Home Owner Grant (over 65 years of age or otherwise qualifying) is \$745, and is eliminated at \$929,000 of assessed value. The grant is reduced by \$5 for every \$1,000 of residential assessed value in excess of \$780,000.

Regardless of the grant amount, taxpayers are responsible for the following minimum taxes payable: Basic Grant, the minimum tax payable is \$350 plus water and sewer; Basic and Added Home Owner Grant, the minimum tax payable is \$100 plus water and sewer.

2006 Water and Sewer Rates Set

Council has approved a 2% increase in sanitary sewer rates and a 9.25% increase in water rates for 2006. The new rates will pay for Burnaby's share of the construction required to maintain water quality, replace aging water pipes and provide for sewer maintenance. The rate increases will ensure that the water and sanitary sewer utilities continue to be financially self-sustaining. The 2006 annual charge for a single family residence, if paid by March 15, is \$308.85 for sewer and \$267.45 for water. If paid after March 15, the charge is \$325.11 for sewer and \$281.53 for water.

2006 Utility Payment Due on March 15

Burnaby's annual flat rate water charge, sewer use charge and sewer parcel tax are billed separately from property taxes and are due on Wednesday, March 15, 2006. To promote payment by the due date, a 5% discount will be applied to flat rate water and sewer charges paid by March 15, 2006 and to metered water and sewer rates paid within 30 days of the billing date. The 2006 Utility Statements will be mailed at the beginning of February.

The utility charges must be paid by the due date to be eligible for the 5% discount, whether or not a Utility Statement is received. If you have not received your Utility Statement by February 10, phone the Tax Office at 604-294-7350. Payments received AFTER March 15 are not eligible for the discount. Unpaid charges are added to 2006 taxes and will be subject to the same penalties as property taxes. Property taxes will be due July 5, 2006.
